January – Saturday the 13th

Laura Fraga will give us a presentation on the “Dear Jane Phenomenon.”

With beloved memories of watching her grandmother hand quilt traditional quilts, Laura discovered her own love of quilting at her first quilting class in 1990. Once she mastered the basics, she developed a passion for hand appliqué and making “Dear Jane” quilts. She soon found herself winning blue ribbons and recognition at the national level, and is now sharing her inspiration and passion for quilting through lectures and classes. January Class – Sunday the 14th

Laura Fraga is back with us on Sunday to teach her hand appliqué techniques. She is known to be a master, so don’t miss this opportunity! Space is still available!!!

February – Saturday the 10th

Famed artist Thom Atkins will present his latest quilts, beautifully embellished by bead embroidery. His work is truly amazing, so you won’t want to miss this trunk show!

About 15 years ago, Thom, a sculptor, was involved in a traffic accident that severely damaged his wrists and thumbs. Since it was clear that pushing clay around was no longer a possibility, he decided to combine his love of beads with fabric, and explore the pairing as a new medium of expression. In time, surgery repaired the damage, but the shift had been made and a whole new vista of fabric and beads had opened up. “Bead Embellished Quilts,” less sculptural and more colorful, became the order of the day. Finding the balance between beads and fabric, where each is integrated into the design and both are essential to the overall composition, has provided ample challenges for Thom’s active imagination. He has come to a point where neither “Bead Embellished” nor “Quilt” seem accurate or applicable terms, yet he continues to use them for lack of more precise definitions of what he does. February Class – Sunday the 11th

Thom Atkins will be teaching his bead embroidery techniques for quilters. The class is full, but if you’re interested, put your name on the waiting list... you just might make it into the class!

March – Saturday the 10th

For March, we’ll welcome renowned artist/quilter and author Katie Pasquini Masopust. She’ll be presenting her lecture “Painting with Cloth,” where she’ll talk about her development from early paintings through traditional quilts up to the present contemporary wall quilts.

For nearly 30 years Katie Pasquini Masopust has produced high quality contemporary art quilts that have been coveted and collected by a broad range of admirers. From her early beginnings as a painter dabbling in traditional quilt making, her work has evolved from structured Mandalas and mind-blowing dimensional

pieces to very painterly landscapes and abstracts executed with the finest fabrics and most creative stitching techniques.

Katie's easy, energetic manner has made her a very popular teacher and lecturer. When not in residence at her studio in Northern California she travels the world presenting her contemporary quilting theories and techniques to classes; not only in North America, but in Europe, the Far East, Australia and New Zealand. Awards and accolades have been numerous for Katie, culminating with her 2005 induction into a very select group of art quilt professionals who have earned the Silver Star Award presented by Houston Quilt Festival. On Sunday, Katie will teach her “Artful Log Cabin” technique, where she uses a photograph for inspiration to design contemporary log cabin blocks into a finished quilt. Her class is full, but if you put your name on the wait list, you just might make it into the class!

In April, we'll be dazzled by the enormously talented Pati Fried. Pati will discuss the principles of modern quilt design and how a traditional quilter might explore these principles to challenge their design skills. Pati will share how the fundamental Elements of Design can be inspired by everyday life. Using these principles and elements can act as a roadmap for venturing into new design territory. Desert Guilds Quilt Show

Friday, March 2 and Saturday, March 3 from 10am to 4pm
at the Palm Springs Pavillion

Save those dates!! That is when we are having our Desert Guilds Quilt Show. Why Desert Guilds?? Because it is a joint show with Cactus Sewables, Pass Patchers and us.

Every guild member is eligible to enter a quilt in the main entry category, but because of space constraints we can only have 40 entries from our guild. This is a great opportunity if you

have never entered a quilt show to show your quilt. It is not a juried show but ribbons are given out by the vendors and the show committee members and board. And, of course there is Best of Show which was won in 2016 by our guild member Helen Anderson. If you are a member of more than one of the guilds involved, you need to choose a guild to do your entry through.

We had sign ups to see who might enter the show. If you did not sign up you can still enter — it will be the first 40 entries that will get in. You have between now and January 23 to get your form and photos in. 2 photos of the quilt and one of you. Only the top needs to be finished for the photo since it is just for identification purposes.

Entry forms will be available on the information table at the guild meetings or download a form from Desert Guilds Quilt Show website. Our color is red but if you download a form just put a red dot on it. You may mail those in or give it to Kathleen Herring at the January meeting.

Quilts need to be delivered to the Pavilions on Thursday, March 1 between 10am and 12pm.

There are other opportunities to enter a quilt in the show. You can make a **MINIATURE QUILT!** You can have as many entries as you like in this area. There are two categories:

- Miniature quilts — blocks no bigger than 3 inches and perimeter no greater than 72 inches
- Art quilts — perimeter no larger than 72 inches.

Entry forms will be on the information table and on the website. Then finished quilts and entry forms need to be given to Jackie Mason, our Miniature Quilt representative by the February meeting.

There is voting for Best of Show in both categories.

A third opportunity to enter and win a ribbon is the **CHALLENGE QUILT**. The theme this show is “Off the Beaten Path” and each member may enter one quilt. The quilt needs to have a perimeter between 60 and 120 inches. There is no challenge fabric for this quilt so let your imagination run wild. Just remember to include a road and a sign. Check information table or website for detailed instructions and/or entry form. These quilts need to be delivered to Robert Tucker, The Challenge Quilt Chairperson, at the February meeting in a brown paper bag. There will be a judging by members at the February meeting and ribbons given to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place. You could also win a best of show ribbon at the show.

Don't forget to buy a **MEMBER'S ONLY 2 day pass** to the show. Everyone going to the show needs a ticket or pass even when volunteering. These \$5 passes go on sale at the January meeting. (Otherwise it is \$7/day to get in. Remember this is a fund raiser for our guild.)

We will need lots of **VOLUNTEERS** — to help take in quilts on Thursday, white glove, runners to deliver lunches to vendors, collect entrance fees, count best of show ballots, take down quilts, set up and run boutique, sell tickets to the Opportunity Quilt, etc. etc. Kim Carlson, Volunteer Coordinator, will be taking signups beginning our January meeting (as well as selling passes.)

CVQG and Pass Patchers are running **THE BOUTIQUE** at the show. Pat Siegel, Boutique Coordinator, is looking for lots of HANDMADE items to fill the boutique and help us to raise

money so we can continue to have fantastic speakers and a great venue to meet in. Last November Pat and Nancy Wilhelm demonstrated a pod bag and a wallet that would make ideal boutique items. If you picked up a pattern don't forget you agreed to make a couple of those items for the boutique. In the afternoon, after this November meeting, there was another Round Robin where a really cute coin purse and a project holder were demonstrated (along with two techniques).

Finally, please help us to **advertise** this wonderful event. Take some postcards (available at the end of this newsletter or at the meeting) and give them out to friends, people in your friendship groups, people at church, put in your church newsletter, give to people in your

exercise class, post at your beauty salon/nail salon, and post on any bulletin boards in your communities. (if you need a larger version of the postcard on paper contact Kathleen Herring.) Please help make this a wonderful and successful event.
